1. T. B. Sutton General Store

This two-story 1865 landmark hosts Granville's main eatery. On Saturday nights, it also hosts the Sutton Ole Time Music Hour, a bluegrass dinner show similar to the Grand Ole Opry.

2. Granville Museum

Housed in a historic church building, this museum highlights the town's heritage through photo collections.

3. Shopping, Craftsmen Shops and Bed & Breakfasts

Shop for gifts, clothing, Mayberry & Lucy items, then getaway for a couple of nights at one of our two B&B's in the center of town.

4. Mayberry - I Love Lucy Museum

Check out Lucy's house, right down to the vintage dishes in her kitchen, then stroll through Floyd's barbershop and the rest of Andy's neighborhood.

5. Sutton Homeplace & Pioneer Village

The 19th-century residence has been restored with authentic furnishings, but with themed exhibits that change every quarter.



6. Festivals Galore

Seven annual festivals throughout the year celebrate everything from Mayberry to moonshine.

7. Live Theater

Special live performances fill the calendar such as the Mayberry Dinner Theater at Sutton's General Store for Christmas & Valentine's Day and an Outdoor Spring Play in Pioneer Village. Experience all the Andy Griffith characters coming to life!

8. Farm to Table Museum

This museum traces what's grown on the farm to your plate, along with how animals were once part of the area's transportation system.

9. Granville Tour

Granville tour includes 10 different venues with antique cars, ice cream, Tennessee Textile & Quilt Museum, & more!

10. World's Largest Whiskey Decanter Museum

Communities include Cookeville, Sparta, Livingston, Monterey, Crossville, Smithville, Granville, Jamestown, Clarkrange, Gainesboro, Byrdstown, Celina, Carthage, McMinnville, Woodbury, Red Boiling Springs, Lafayette and Rugby. Each town has hidden treasures waiting to be discovered.

Play In The Incredible Rivers & Lakes

Book a canoe or kayak trip down the picturesque Caney Fork River with **Canoe the Caney** in Smithville. Rated as one of Tennessee's top outfitters, Canoe the Caney provides affordable family fun led by a friendly, experienced crew, whether you like thrilling or relaxing.

In Sparta, **Kayaking Adventures of Tennessee** offers guided kayaking trips to Burgess Falls on a peaceful lake for all skill levels.

Dale Hollow Lake near Byrdstown is an ideal lake vacation destination. **Sunset Marina** rents houseboats, pontoons, jet skis, ski boats and fishing boats. Dale Hollow Lake is a legendary fishing destination. In fact, the world-record smallmouth bass was caught at Dale Hollow Lake.



Go Chasing Waterfalls

The Upper Cumberland is renowned for its stunning waterfalls. Many of the falls are easily accessible.

One of the state's largest and most visited parks is **Fall Creek Falls**, which encompasses nearly 30,000 acres across the eastern top of the Cumberland Plateau. The Park's largest waterfall, Fall Creek Falls, is 256 feet tall and one of the highest waterfalls in the eastern United States.

The state park has several options for overnight lodging, including cabins, campsites and a new resort-style lodge.



From The Heavens to Deep Underground

For views of the dazzling night sky, pitch your tent at **Pickett CCC Memorial State Park** near Jamestown. In 2015, Pickett became the first in the Southeast to gain the prestigious Silver-Tier International Dark Sky Park designation, recognizing its rich views of the night sky. Built by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the 1930s, the park has hiking trails, rustic cabins, a recreation lodge, a ranger station and a 12 acre lake.

Choose your own underground adventure, from easy to extreme, at **Cumberland Caverns** near McMinnville. Located in Cardwell Mountain, Cumberland Caverns invites you to journey 333 feet beneath the surface and discover its storied history and rare formations.





Peek into the Past

Visit Granville, Tennessee's Mayberry Town. The nostalgic town is operated by 200 volunteers who serve as docents in its historic buildings and museums. Tour the **T.B. Sutton General Store**, the **Mayberry and I Love Lucy Museum**, an 1800s cabin, **Pioneer Village**, and much more. Every Saturday night, the **T.B. Sutton General Store** hosts the *Sutton Ole Time Music Hour*, a live bluegrass radio show complete with a Southern style dinner. Book an overnight stay at **Wildwood Resort & Marina** on the shores of Cordell Hull Lake. The resort has a lodge and cabin rentals, vintage Airstream trailer rentals, restaurants, pontoon boat excursions and live music.

Shop on Historic Squares

The Upper Cumberland towns have preserved many of their historic squares, which have become popular shopping districts where you can find everything from antiques to unique gifts and souvenirs. For instance, the town of Livingston dates to 1833, and the center of activity for the community has always been the **Livingston Town Square**. Residents take pride in preserving the square's history and viability, and visitors can spend a day shopping among the square's historic buildings housing a variety of merchants. You'll find antiques, boutiques, jewelers, and the **1806 General Store**, which has a popular eatery that serves homemade soups, salads and daily specials.



Enjoy World-Class Entertainment

Attend a musical theater production at Crossville's top attraction, the **Cumberland County Playhouse**. The Playhouse has been entertaining crowds in the region since 1965 and attracts more than 100,000 visitors each year with professional-caliber plays and Broadway-style musicals. When in Cookeville, check out the performances and plays at **CPAC**. Woodbury in Cannon County also has an **Arts Center**, which consists of a playhouse, art gallery and concert venue.

Take A Culinary Journey

In Gainesboro, try **The Bull & Thistle Pub**. It serves fine Celtic fare on the historic courthouse square. Favorites include fish and chips, Irish meatloaf and corned beef and cabbage. Seafood lovers shouldn't miss **The Stolen Coin Oyster Bar & Bistro**, another gem on on the square. For breakfast or lunch, **Haven on Hull** in Gainesboro has an enticing array of sandwiches, salads, baked goods, coffees and teas.

Coffee fans make a beeline to **Button Willow General Store & Coffee Shop** in Smithville for its flavored coffees (both hot and iced), cupcakes, and merchandise by local artists. In Cookeville, head to **Ralph's Donut Shop** and try one of their fan favorites, the butter twists. While you are at it, you might as well grab some cinnamon rolls, cream horns, muffins, lady fingers, turnovers, and of course, their tasty donuts.

When happy hour rolls around, check out what's on tap at **Happy Trails Brewing Co.** in downtown Sparta. The small brewery and taproom serves a mix of their own beers along with other local, regional and national beers. While in Sparta, you can also visit **Calfkiller Brewing Co.**, a brewery started by two brothers. Reserve a behind-the-scenes tour and see how the beer is made.

Wine lovers will enjoy exploring the **Upper Cumberland Wine Trail**, which includes eight family-owned wineries and vineyards. Many offer free tastings, and travelers who complete the entire wine trail receive a special gift after receiving the final stamp on the Wine Trail Rack Card.

Located just outside of Crossville, Black Mountain is one of Cumberland Trail State Park's premier climbing locations. At 2,900 feet, it is known for its spectacular views and offers top-rate top roping and bouldering.

The boulder field is a great location for beginners to learn the basics and advanced climbers to hone their skills.

Other top rock climbing locations include Copperhead Rock and Buzzard's Roost at Fall Creek Falls State Park. Workshops lead by Park Rangers are also available.

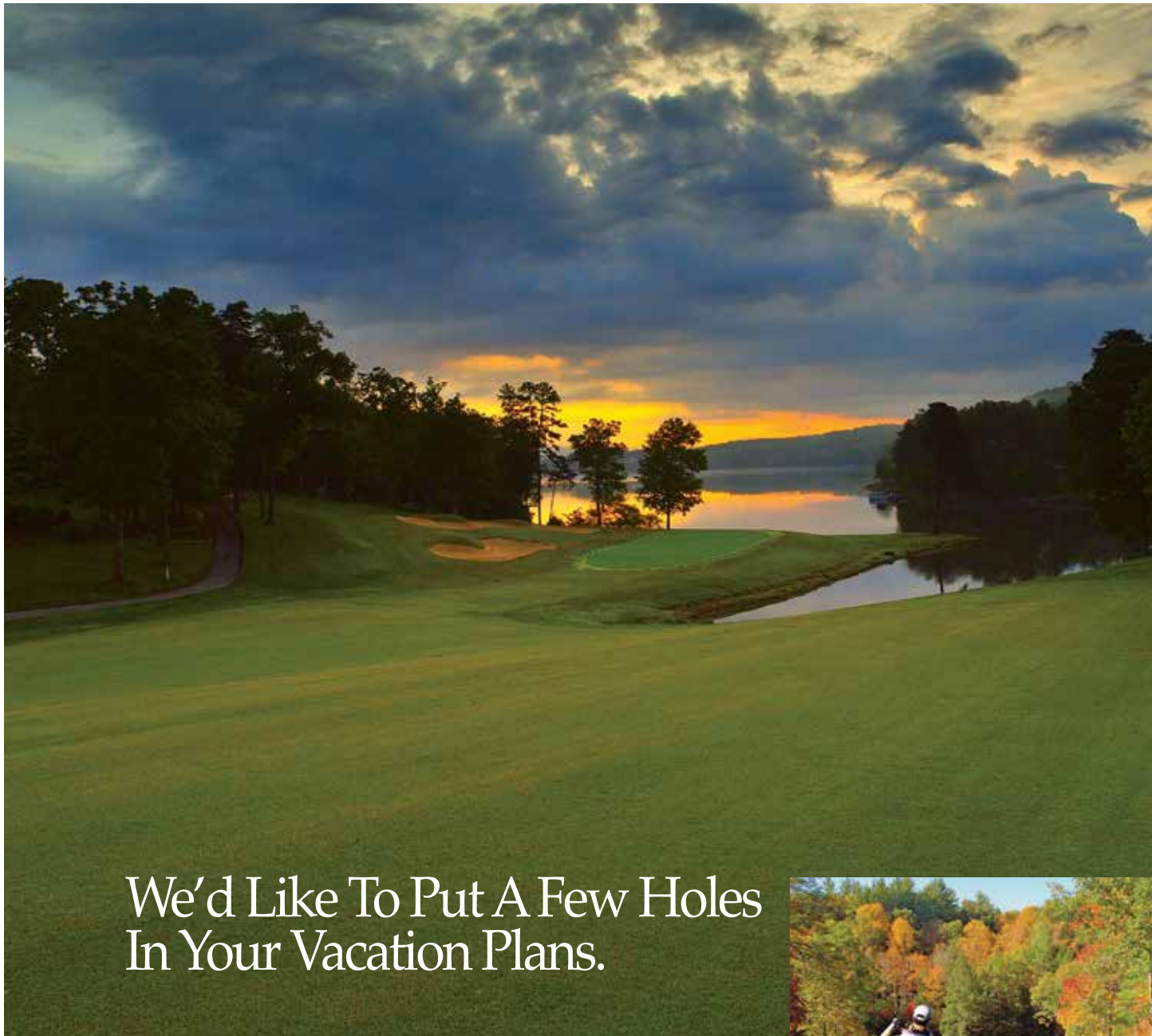

Within Upper Cumberland's 14 counties there are hundreds of waterfalls and cascades to explore. Out of the top 3 highest waterfalls in the state, 2 of them, Fall Creek Falls & Coon Creek Falls, are located in the region. If you've ever stood beneath a majestic waterfall that stands 250 feet above you, then you know that it's a memory that you'll never forget. If you have not taken in the awe and wonder in such a scenario, now's your chance to chase some of the most unforgettable waterfalls in America.

If you're just beginning your journey of seeking out waterfalls in the Upper Cumberland, keep it simple and start with visiting our state parks. Rock Island State Park, Falls Creek Falls, Burgess Falls, Cummins Falls, and other state parks in the region are all great locations to discover some of our most stunning waterfalls while also enjoying all that the parks have to offer.

Guided hikes, family friendly programs and education experiences, camping and cabins, live music, and much more are offered but vary for each park. You can't go wrong with time in our state parks regardless of whether it is your 1st or 100th visit. Our parks are the perfect first step to never-ending adventures.

State Natural Areas are maintained by the state park system but offer more of a wilderness experience. The focus for these public lands is to provide recreational opportunities for locals and guests but it's also centered more towards the preservation of the natural land and thus have less development than the state parks do.

Ozone Falls, Lost Creek Falls, Virgin Falls and Colditz Cove are included in this group of waterfalls and trails. While you won't find bathrooms with plumbing, snack machines, or the consistent presence of park staff, you will find some of the most pristine and tranquil areas in the state. With a little prepping ahead of time you can help to keep the natural beauty of each destination maintained by practicing responsible stewardship.

Kayak to the base of Burgess or Fancher Falls, take a summertime dip under Carmac Falls while being a day or overnight guest at Evins Mill, get lost in curiosity as you watch the breathtaking flow of Virgin Falls disappear the moment it hits the ground, view two of the top three highest waterfalls in Tennessee drop 250ft to the ground at the same time, or study the geological wonders of the world while standing behind Big Laurel Falls.

The best time to visit our waterfalls? Late winter to early spring. Summer brings more of a crowd and evening storms can create a bit too much of a flow, but it is still a great time to be here as well.

From July to September is when some of the falls will start to trickle. It often depends on the rainfall. But there are hundreds of waterfalls in the area, and it's always possible to find plenty with flow. It will just take a little extra looking around.

For instance, take Twin Falls in Rock Island State Park. Twin Falls is a man-made waterfall that was created by accident when the dam was built and pushed water out and into Caney Fork River. Consequently, it has a phenomenal flow at all times. There are best times to see this and that, but you can find beauty on any day that you spend here.

Located on the Falling Water River, this day use park is noted for its natural beauty and four waterfalls that cascade down from over 250 feet in elevation. The last of these falls plunges more than 130 feet into the gorge.

Carmac Falls

Located on the private property of Evins Mill, a resort and special events venue, the short hike to the falls is reserved for guests, or you can purchase a reservations-only package.

Enjoy the Lake Life

Our three major lakes in the Upper Cumberland are **Center Hill Lake, Cordell Hull Lake** and **Dale Hollow Lake**. All three are under the stewardship of the U.S. Corps of Engineers and have been named the cleanest lakes in the state.

All three lakes were originally created by dams built for hydroelectric power generation and flood control. The Dale Hollow Dam and the Center Hill Dam were completed in the 1940s, and Cordell Hull in 1973, creating these stunning lakes with miles of undeveloped shoreline.

Today, they are havens for fishing, swimming, camping, boating, canoeing, hiking, biking, wildlife viewing and outdoor recreation for locals and tourists alike.

Center Hill Lake



Center Hill Lake is a 64-mile long reservoir with 415 miles of largely undeveloped shoreline and 18,200 acres of deep, pure water – the ideal habitat for many species of fish. In addition, there is an abundant supply of wildlife that adds to the natural beauty of DeKalb County and gives sportsmen a diversity of game during the hunting seasons.

Water sports enthusiasts enjoy fishing, swimming, boating and kayaking on the lake. The Army Corps recreation areas offer camping and RV spaces at their parks around the lake.

Nine marinas offer houseboat or pontoon boat rental and they also offer slips for private boats. There are also 7 marina restaurants.

Dale Hollow Lake



In 1943 the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers built the first dam on the Obey, creating the huge Dale Hollow Reservoir. Dale Hollow Dam tamed a wild river and drew tourists and fishermen to the vacation and recreation.

The lake boasts 12 marinas that offer everything for water adventure and outdoor fun. You can rent houseboats or pontoon boats or bring your own and launch it from the many sites. Around the lake there are lots of cabins for rent, plus camp and RV sites. The Corps of Engineers has several parks around the lake for family fun. It is also ideal for fishing. In fact, the largest smallmouth bass ever recorded was landed here.

Cordell Hull Lake



Cordell Hull Lake is located at the base of the Highland Rim, right on the Cumberland River in Smith, Jackson, and Clay counties. Outdoor

recreation activities abound at Cordell Hull and include camping, boating, picnicking, hiking trails, bike trails, horse trails, and wildlife viewing.

If you love fishing, this lake is like a fish convention, with largemouth bass, smallmouth bass, spotted bass, channel catfish, flathead catfish, black crappie, white crappie, walleye, bluegill, sunfish, rock bass, warmouth, white bass, yellow bass, striped bass, hybrid striped bass, paddlefish and sauger.

Cordell Hull Lake has two marinas. One is at Defeated Creek and the other at the **Wildwood Resort & Marina** near Granville.

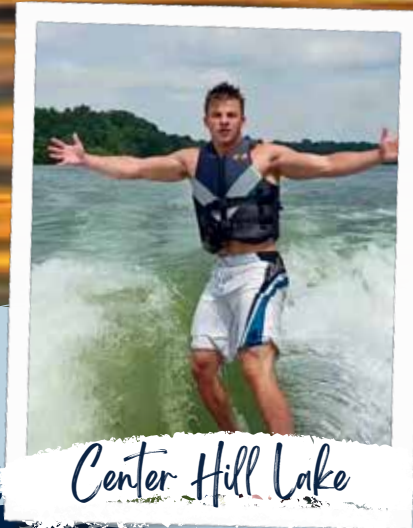

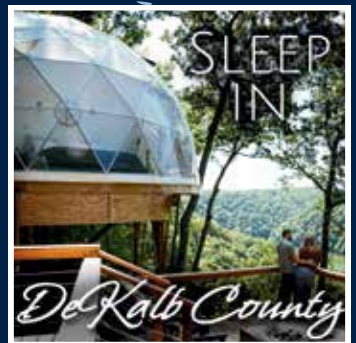

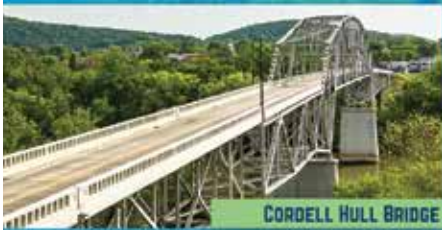

Cumberland River



The Cumberland River was an important river highway in the 1700s, and supported a large riverboat trade. The river is popular among water enthusiasts, and there are a number of parks, boat ramps and facilities along the way, making a day or overnight paddle appealing.

Obey River



The Obey River is a favorite canoeing, kayaking and fishing destination. The campground beside the Obey, managed by the US Army Corps of Engineers, has just about anything a camper could want. It is located right by the Dale Hollow National Fish Hatchery. To the delight of fishermen, the hatchery is one of the main reasons the Obey contains large numbers of rainbow and brown trout.

Caney Fork River



A bald eagle silently soars above, hunting for breakfast. Fish ripple the water in search of tasty insects. The water is placid and glassy, ideal for a morning paddle, but it can move surprisingly fast when Center Hill Dam releases water. This is the Caney Fork, known for its beauty and peaceful demeanor, and a favorite for canoe and kayak enthusiasts and anglers alike. In Rock Island State Park, the Caney Fork is also known for whitewater kayaking, and the State Park has hosted a number of international freestyle kayaking events.



Collins River



Designated as a "Scenic River," the Collins River is a tributary of the Caney Fork, and flows about 60 miles through the Plateau. The overhanging woods hug the banks as the river leisurely makes its way westward, which makes for a relaxing and peaceful paddle. Renowned for its fishing, the Collins River is one of the few rivers in Tennessee stocked with Muskie.

Barren Fork River



The Barren Fork is a 23.4 mile-long tributary of the Collins River, and flows east to west, eventually through the town of McMinnville. It is ideal if you are looking for a smooth, steady current that is perfect for a lazy float in a kayak or canoe. Two easy access points for the river are Riverfront Park right below the dam and Smooth Rapids Outfitters.

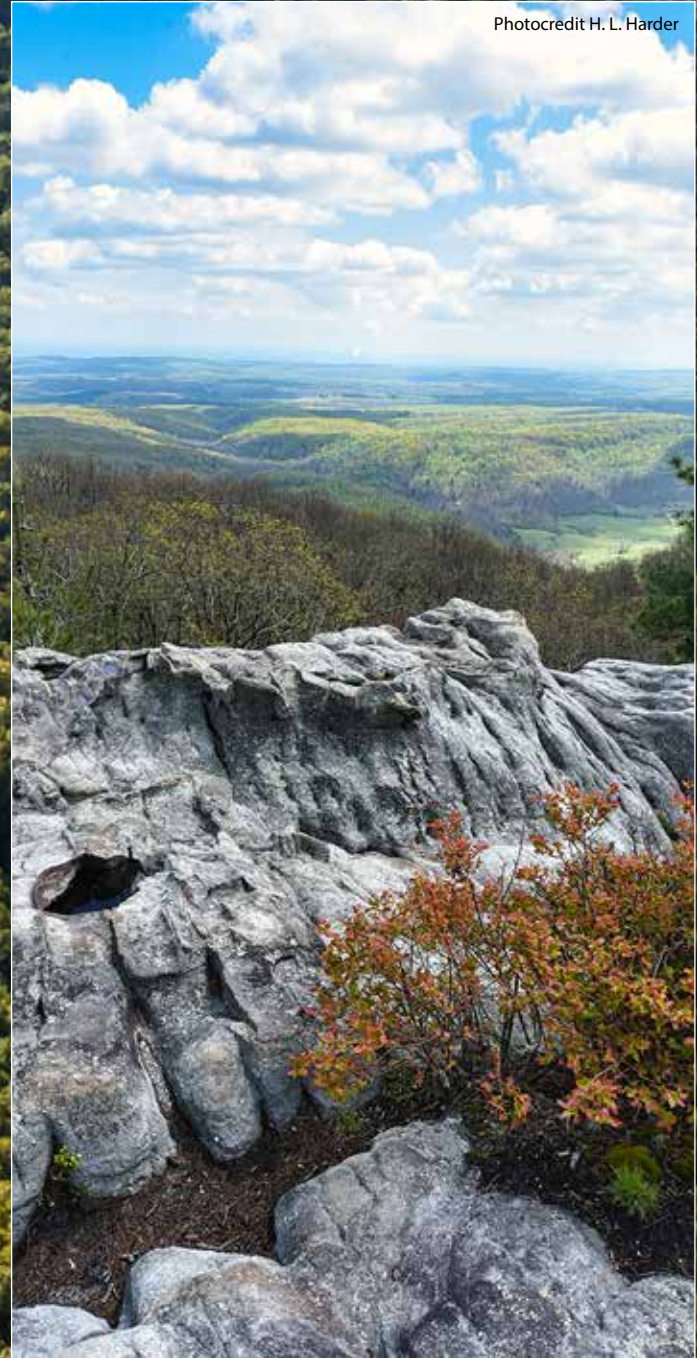
Bee Rock Overlook

Buzzard's Roost

There are several overlooks at Fall Creek Falls. Buzzard's Roost is one of the best. With easy access, Buzzard's Roost has views of Pine Creek on the left and Cane Creek on the right, plus plenty of hiking and waterfalls close by.

Black Mountain Trail/Overlook

This south-facing overlook has views of two giant sinkholes including Grassy Cove, North America's largest sinkhole by volume.

Welch's Point

White County, Bridgestone / Firestone Centennial Wilderness Area



Welch's Point in White County is easy to access. To get there, pass the Virgin Falls parking lot and take the fork to the right. Travel about two miles. When you park, you will have to walk less than 1,000 feet downhill. The overlook faces west for amazing sunsets and breathtaking views of Scott's Gulf and the Caney Fork River Valley.

Martha's Pretty Point

White County, Virgin Falls State Natural Area



Hike about 2 miles along the trail to Virgin Falls and you will find this overlook, which earned its name with a gorgeous view of Big Laurel Creek Valley and the Caney Fork River Valley.



CUMBERLAND NATIONAL SCENIC BYWAY

The Byway stretches about 156 miles along a number of routes, including:
U.S. 25 E, State Route 63, S.R. 52, U.S. 127 and S.R. 111.



One of the most popular historic roads, the byway connects 8 counties and 17 communities, stretching across the Upper Cumberland Plateau of Middle and Eastern Tennessee. The byway is known for its winding trails, mountain paths, unique geology, natural beauty, and rich culture and history. From the Cumberland River to the Cumberland Gap, the route is a glimpse into what was once a hidden frontier in America.

The area was once home to Native Americans from many tribes. It was ultimately claimed by the Cherokee people. In 1775, just before the Revolutionary War, Daniel Boone widened the path through the Cumberland Gap, enabling future settlement of the Tennessee and Kentucky regions – known as “Boone’s Trace.”

EXPLORING

The Cumberland Scenic Byway

Celina – At the western end of the Byway is the old steamboat town of Celina in Clay County. Nearby is the stunning **Dale Hollow Lake**, offering boating, fishing, camping and miles of shoreline to explore.

Standing Stone State Park – More than eight miles of day-use hiking trails, ranging from easy to strenuous, taking you through virgin woods, vivid wildflowers, and around Standing Stone Lake.

Cordell Hull Birthplace State Park – Cordell Hull was the U.S. Secretary of State (1933-1944). He won a Nobel Peace Prize for his role in the creation of the United Nations. Check out the cabin where he was a child, a museum, the historic-themed grounds, and enjoy a hike to **Bunkum Cave** where Hull's father made moonshine.

Forbus General Store – Stop for a fried pie and peruse the unique items on the shelves at the slice-out-of-time 1892 Forbus General Store.

Sgt. Alvin C. York State Park – Walk in the footsteps of one of WWI's most celebrated American heroes. Tour the visitor center, his two-story house, a gristmill, the York Bible School, and a reproduction of a WWI trench.

***Pogue Creek Canyon Natural Area and Pickett CCC Memorial State Park** – *Take a sidetrip on TN 154 from Jamestown* to hike among rock arches, overhanging cliffs, and distinctive geological features. This area is also the home for serious stargazers, and has been named a Silver-Tier international Dark Sky Park.

***Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area** – Explore scenic gorges, sandstone bluffs and the biggest concentration of natural arches in the eastern U.S.

*Both parks have been developed to enhance their natural and historic features with a wide range of outdoor recreational activities including driving scenic back roads, hiking, horseback trail riding, camping, wildlife watching, whitewater canoeing, and interpretive programs.

Rugby – Founded in the 1880s as an experimental utopian colony, historic Rugby is a fully restored Victorian settlement where tours of many of the original buildings provide a glimpse into the past.

Cove Lake State Park – The park is a scenic gem whose intimate lake is nestled against the foot of the Plateau.

Devil's Racetrack – Climb to the top of the 1,800-foot-high rock-ribs via the Cumberland Trail, which intersects the Byway near Cove Lake.

Sundquist and Royal Blue Wildlife Management Areas – Travel through the great, unbroken forests, home range for one of only three elk herds in the eastern United States as well as black bear and many rare species.

Powell Valley Road – Just south of the Cumberland Gap, enjoy one of the most scenic back roads in Tennessee.

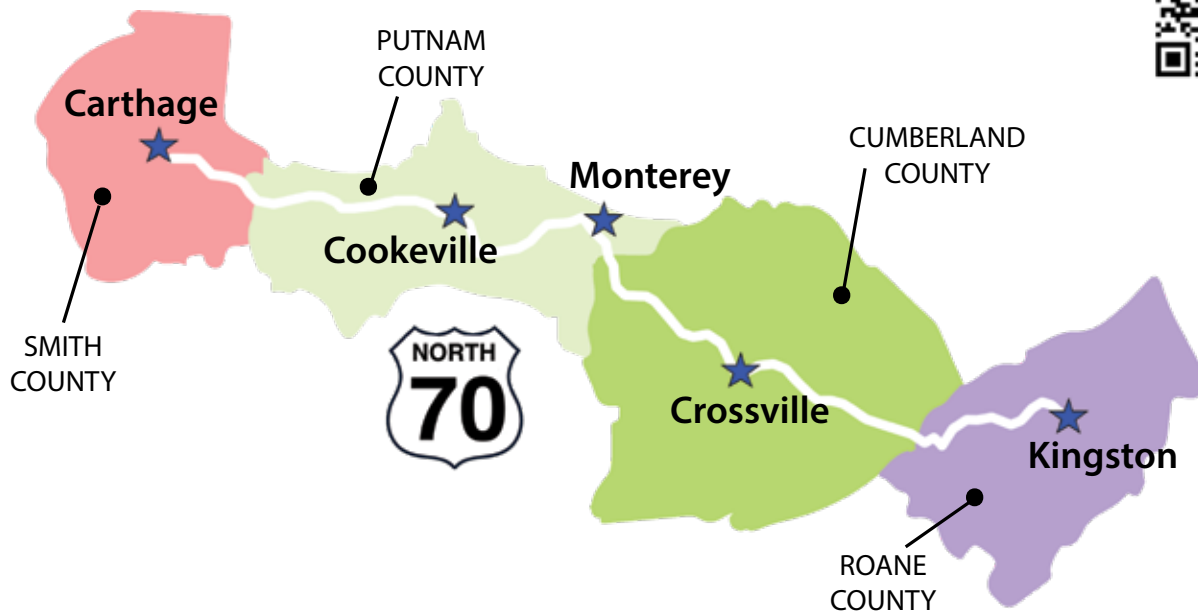


WALTON ROAD HISTORIC BYWAY

Old Walton Road extends about 100 miles along U.S. 70.



After the American Revolution, one army captain received a large tract of land in what is now Carthage, TN, as a reward for his service. His name was William Walton, and his legacy stretches out along a scenic byway stretching from Carthage, across the Cumberland Plateau and down into Tennessee's Great Valley in the east.

The byway takes you on an unforgettable journey through picturesque farmland, by natural wonders, historic sites, places with breathtaking views and plenty of charming towns. Much of the route follows old U.S. 70 and which is a slower but more scenic alternative to traveling I-40.

EXPLORING Walton Road

Carthage – The town’s earliest European-American settler was Revolutionary soldier William Walton (the namesake of the road) in the 1780s. Discover the past at the **Smith County Heritage Museum**, and explore the charming downtown and historic landmarks like the **Smith County Courthouse**, the **Walton Hotel** and the 1936 **Cordell Hull Bridge**.

Cordell Hull Lake – The picturesque lake offers activities including fishing, hunting, camping, picnicking, boating, hiking, and horseback riding.

Cookeville – In the Upper Cumberland’s largest city, you will find all kinds of sweet treats and delicious eats. When shopping on the historic **West Side**, you will also find a wide choice of great restaurants for lunch or dinner.

Speaking of historic, check out the **Cookeville History Museum** and the **Depot Museum**. Or reach out to the adjoining City of Algood for a tour of an Antebellum home known as **White Plains**, which started out as an inn for travelers along Walton Road. If you are interested in Civil Rights history, grab a John Dog and a beverage at **John’s Place**. In the 1960s, every restaurant and bar in Putnam County was segregated except for the African-American owned John’s Place, which became a popular hang-out where everyone was welcome, regardless of race. John’s Place is on the National Register of Historic Places.

Monterey – Stroll through downtown and soak up the small town charm, then head over to the old **Train Depot** where you can learn the history of this part of the U.C. The **Bee Rock Overlook** is located just outside of town. Take a short hike to the summit where you can gaze out over the thickly forested ridges and deep valleys, and you’ll understand why Monterey’s motto is “where the hilltops kiss the sky.”

Crossville – With 9 championship golf courses that await golfers of all skill levels, Crossville and Cumberland County lays claim to being the “Golf Capital of Tennessee.” You’ll also find the **Cumberland County Playhouse** here, where you can catch a professional-level play or Broadway production, plenty of places to grab a tasty bite, an outstanding military museum, two wineries, plus lots of shopping and music.

The **Cumberland Homestead Historic District** (see page 54) on the south part of town tells the story of the Great Depression and FDR’s New Deal-era initiative which provided Subsistence Homesteads to the region’s distressed farmers, coal miners, and factory workers. Built as part of the project is nearby **Cumberland Mountain State Park**, featuring golf, camping, biking & hiking, cabin rentals, dining and paddling on the man-made lake.

Ozone Falls – On the eastern edge of Cumberland County, you’ll find Ozone Falls State Natural Area. The Falls plunge 110 feet over a sandstone cap into a deep, rock strewn pool.

Kingston & Roane County – High on a hilltop in Kingston, above the confluence of the Clinch and Tennessee Rivers, **Fort Southwest Point** tells a story of this region’s importance in the early days of the state. Built in 1797 just a few years before the Walton Road opened, the fort was home to soldiers initially there to serve as peacekeepers with the Cherokee and to provide escorts for white settlers.

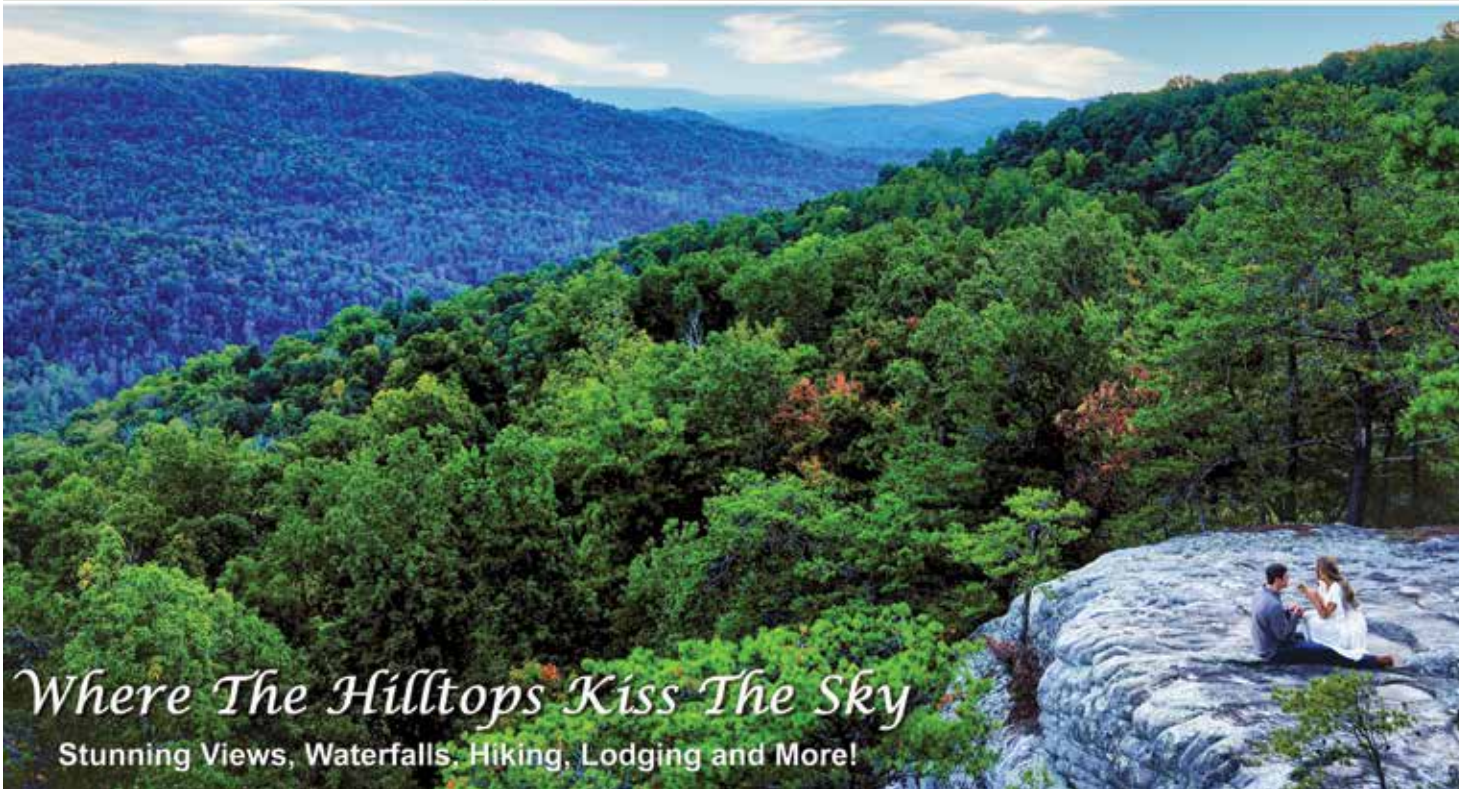

CRUISIN' The CUMBERLAND

12 Self-Guided Rides

For those of you who like to escape to the open road, the scenic byways and loop routes in the 14 counties offer epic rides through beautiful landscapes. Many of the described rides begin and end at Cookeville, the hub of the Upper Cumberland. While satisfying a biker's craving for curves, these routes are enjoyed by everyone who just enjoys a pretty ride.

Center Hill Thrill – About 77 Miles

Make your way along the historic Walton Road Scenic Byway through Buffalo Valley, home to the Middle Tennessee Dragway. Travel along Highway 96 near **Edgar Evins State Park** through Smithville, and stop by the **Appalachian Center for Craft**, a satellite campus of **Tennessee Tech University** promoting excellence in American craft. Cross over Center Hill Lake, which holds 415 miles of largely undeveloped shoreline and 18,200 acres of deep, pure water. While in Baxter, enjoy a history lesson at the **Baxter Depot Museum**, one of the three depot museums in Putnam County.

Famous Falls – About 178 Miles

Take in the welcoming waterfalls of **Burgess Falls State Park**, where the Falling Water drops 250 feet around breathtaking scenery and awe-inspiring overlooks. Next, savor the scenic beauty of **Rock Island State Park**, a park dominated by the **Great Falls of the Caney Fork River**. This 883-acre park has a natural sand beach on Center Hill Reservoir. Continue on to **Fall Creek Falls State Park**, voted by *Southern Living Magazine* as the best state park in the southeastern United States. The park boasts **Fall Creek Falls**, the highest waterfall in the eastern United States at 256 feet. Finalize your falls tour in Crossville at the popular **Ozone Falls**.

Over the Lakes and Through the Parks – About 149 Miles

With three lakes that create more than 1,200 miles of shoreline and 16 state parks and natural areas within a 45-minute drive of Cookeville, this ride will allow you to weave alongside wonderful waterways. Cross over **Cordell Hull Lake** as you make your way through the historic and charming towns of Gainesboro and Granville. Explore the curving countryside of Buffalo Valley, then cross Center Hill Lake and travel through the 6,000-acre **Edgar Evins State Park** near Smithville. Revel in **Rock Island State Park's** winding roads and wondrous waterfalls. Enjoy the bows and bends carrying you onward through **Burgess Falls State Park**, deemed one of the "Top Five Ways to Stay Cool in Tennessee" by *Southern Living Magazine*.

Standing Stone Loop – About 94 Miles

Ride through Livingston and weave through the hills and valleys of the Upper Cumberland into **Standing Stone State Park**. The park covers nearly 11,000 acres and is noted for its outstanding scenery, spring wildflowers, and fossils. Circle back through historic Gainesboro, located near Cordell Hull Lake, then continue your tour along the charming, rural terrain into Granville, where you can experience bygone days. Take in scenic rural landscapes as you return on the historic Walton Road Scenic Byway.

Byway to Bluegrass – About 105 Miles

Let the Historic Walton Road Scenic Byway carry you through Sparta, known as Bluegrass USA and hometown of legendary bluegrass artist Lester Flatt. Take in views of the countryside leading you to **Cumberland Caverns**, Tennessee's largest show cave and a U.S. National Natural Landmark. The cave displays some of the most spectacular formations in America. Located 333 feet below ground, The Volcano Room with its chandelier doubles as an amphitheater for music performances. Continue to Smithville, where the annual **Fiddlers' Jamboree and Crafts Festival** draws thousands. And for more bluegrass, stop by **The Whistle Stop Cafe** as you head back through Baxter.

That Dam Ride – About 184 Miles

At **Burgess Falls State Park**, enjoy picnicking below the dam, which is also a popular fishing spot along the Falling Water River. Take Highway 70 across Center Hill Lake toward the Buffalo Valley Recreation Area to see **Center Hill Dam**, a 260-foot structure composed of concrete and earth. Continue your "dam good" tour to **Cordell Hull Reservoir**. Its gravity dam, located near Carthage, rises 87 feet above the streambed and is 1,306 feet long. Resume your route to **Standing Stone State Park**, which boasts a dam forming the X-shaped Standing Stone Lake. Next stop is **Dale Hollow Dam and Lake**. Situated on the Tennessee border, the **National Fish Hatchery** is the largest federal trout hatchery east of the Mississippi, producing 1.5 million trout annually.

Rugby Ride – About 179 Miles

Take in the scenery as you venture through Livingston and Jamestown along curving and captivating roadways. Cross into the **Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area**, which encompasses 125,000 acres of the Cumberland Plateau. The park is rich with natural and historic features. Make your way into **Rugby**, a restored Victorian village founded in 1880 and nestled between the Big South Fork National Recreation Area and the Rugby State Natural Area. Enjoy lunch at the **Harrow Road Cafe** and take in the rugged river gorges and historic trails. Travel on to the home of the **World's Largest Pumpkin in Allardt**, then coil your way back along the turns and switchbacks of Wilder Mountain.

Ride Back in Time – About 109 Miles

Let the winding roads of the Upper Cumberland take you back in time. Wet your whistle at the **Bull and Thistle Restaurant and Pub**, located on Gainesboro's charming town square. Discover a healing and haunting history in Red Boiling Springs with points-of-interest like the **Armour's Hotel** and the **Thomas House**. Visit the **Walton Hotel**, built in 1904 by William Walton. Truly step back in time as you are welcomed to Granville, home of the **Sutton Ole Time Music Hour**, **T.B. Sutton's General Store** and **Sutton Homestead** and **Pioneer Village**.

Sergeant York's Ride – About 115 Miles

Wind your way through the hills around Livingston and across Dale Hollow Lake into Byrdstown and onward to Highway 127, home to the World's Longest Yard Sale. Discover a heroic history at the **Sergeant Alvin C. York State Historic Park**, located in the Pall Mall community of the Wolf River Valley. The State Park pays tribute to York, the marksman who became one of the most decorated soldiers of World War I. Continue to Jamestown, home to Tennessee's oldest winery, **Highland Manor**. **Sawbriar Brewing** brews craft beer at the same location.

Water to Wine Route – About 160 Miles

Cummins Falls, situated inside a 211-acre state park, was voted one of the top 10 swimming holes in the U.S. by *Travel and Leisure Magazine*. As you are carried down the Promised Land Trail to **DelMonaco Winery and Vineyards** in Baxter, you can continue to **Stonehaus Winery** atop the Cumberland Plateau. U.S. Highway 127 will take you to Jamestown, home of Tennessee's oldest winery, **Highland Manor Winery (and Sawbriar Brewing)**, and the headquarters of the 127 Corridor Sale, 690 miles of authentic "American picking" that takes place every August. As you travel back to Cookeville over Wilder Mountain, these rural back roads will lead you to **Monterey's Depot Museum** for some local railroad and regional history.

The Boilermaker – About 120 Miles

Expect an education in stein and 'shine as you tour the Upper Cumberland's first microbrewery and moonshine distillery. Begin by heading to Blue Springs Road, just off Calfkiller Highway. **Calfkiller Brewing Company** is minutes from downtown Sparta. With luck, the Sergio brothers will share their history in hops. Head across Center Hill Lake to **Short Mountain Distillery**. Short Mountain is Tennessee's sixth distillery making authentic, small-batch Tennessee moonshine, bourbon and Tennessee whiskey. As you turn back, take in the beauty of Hurricane Bridge Recreation Area, located on the west side of Center Hill Lake. Add some wine to your stein and 'shine as you circle back through Baxter, home to **DelMonaco Winery and Vineyards**.

Calfkiller Loop – About 67 Miles

Bask in the beauty of **Burgess Falls State Park** and its cascading waterfalls. As you journey toward Sparta – home of world-famous whitewater kayaking manufacturer, **Jackson Kayak** – take in the sights of **Liberty Square**, including the historic **Oldham Theatre**. Keep an eye out along the Calfkiller River as you wind through wonderful scenes of water and wildlife. Stop in for an education in craft brewing with "the beer brothers," Don and Dave Sergio. They own the famous **Calfkiller Brewing Company**, the region's first microbrewery. Prepare for a rush along the Calfkiller Highway – characterized by plentiful curves, bends and turns - as you journey back to Monterey. Follow the old Walton Highway back to Cookeville.

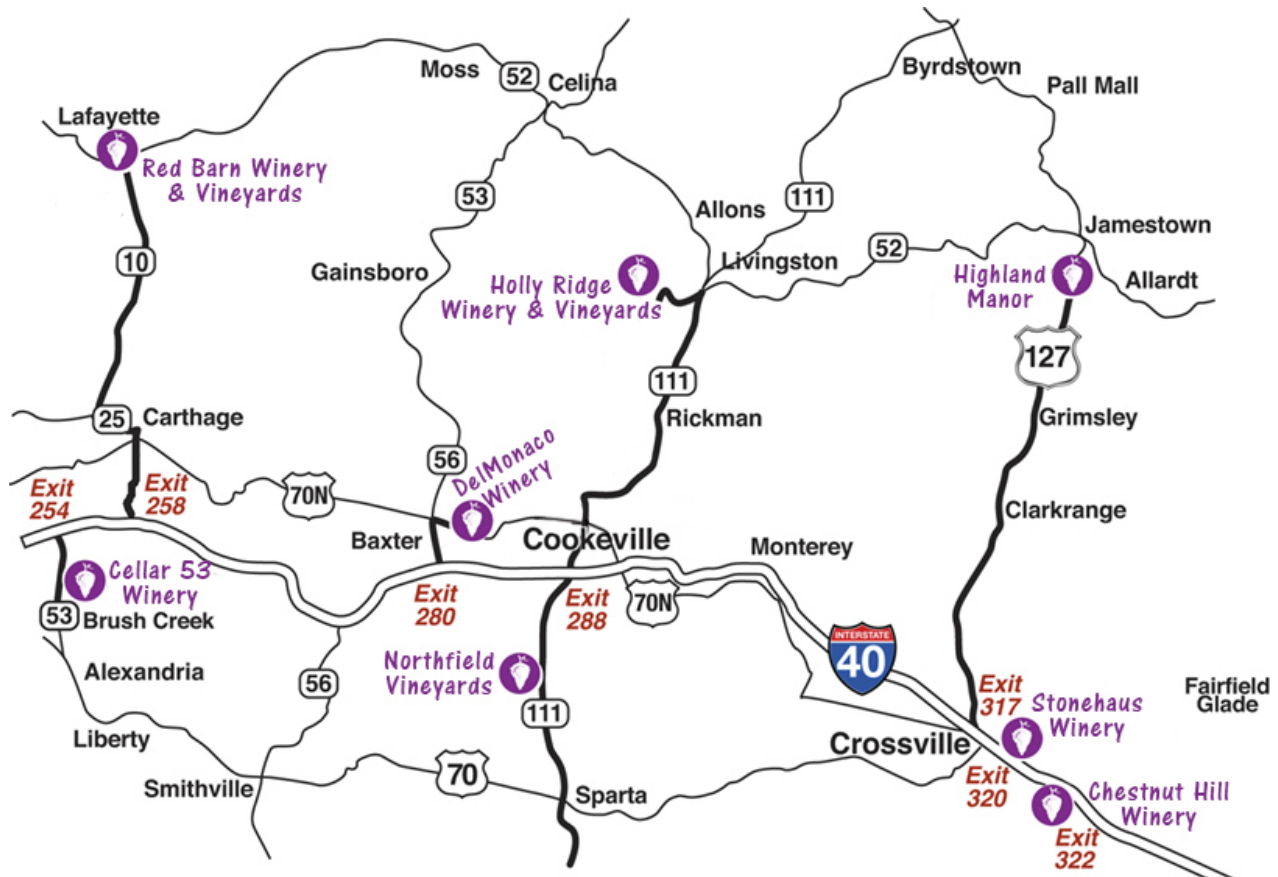

Exploring the Appalachian Center for Craft



High on a wooded ridge overlooking Center Hill Lake is an internationally recognized school that produces some of the finest artists and craftsmen in the country. The **Appalachian Center for Craft** is a campus of the nationally accredited School of Art, Craft & Design within the College of Fine Arts at Tennessee Tech. It is an enclave for creativity as students are taught by master artists to develop their skills in wood, metals, fibers, clay and glass media.

The Center's **Fine Art Retail Gallery** showcases art you can purchase in a wide range of media, and is considered one of the best retailers of contemporary American fine craft in the southeast. It represents the work of 100+ artists whose work ranges from the contemporary to the traditional. You can find world-class, handmade functional and sculptural fine craft including handblown glass, ceramics, jewelry, furniture, decorative metals and ironwork, quilts, textiles and weaving, clocks, lamps, candles, wood carvings and turned bowls, plus books and craft supplies.

If you want to go for a walk and contemplate your potential purchases, take a hike on one of the four hiking trails on site, which deliver beautiful views of Center Hill Lake. The hikes range from easy (the 2-mile Overlook Road Walk) to difficult (the 2.8-mile Pedigo Point Trail).

You'll want to wander through the exhibition spaces which display work from students, faculty, workshop instructors, artists in residence and alumni. The Craft Center hosts multiple exhibitions annually featuring functional and sculptural works of traditional and contemporary fine craft and mixed media by international, national and regional artists including artists from the campus.

Throughout the summer, participants may find workshops for a variety of skill levels in blacksmithing, clay, fibers, glass, metals and wood. Workshops are accessible to those who want to learn an entirely new skill as well as those who want to refine their existing skills. Artists from across the country and our own campus lead workshops in our professionally equipped studios throughout the summer.

THE HISTORIC CUMBERLAND HOMESTEADS

Today, this “Showplace of the New Deal” – constructed from 1934-1938 on second growth timberland about 4 miles south of Crossville – incredibly preserves 10,250 of the original 27,802 acres and 218 of the 251 houses once constructed there. This area also includes Homesteads Tower and Museum, Homesteads House Museum and 1,720-acre Cumberland Mountain State Park, home to Byrd Lake.

At the junction of US 127 S and TN 68, the iconic tower is adjacent to Homestead School and includes exhibits, photographs, artifacts and archival records, many of which were donated by residents. The octagonal building was constructed in 1937-1938 and includes a winding stairway around a large water tank that leads to the top of the 8-story building, revealing interior stone work every bit as impressive as what you see on the structure’s exterior. Those who reach the top are rewarded with a spectacular view of the area. Any-one not making the climb can view the same scene via a live cam at: cumberlandhomesteads.org.

Homesteads House Museum (2611 Pigeon Ridge Road) includes furnishings from 1930s that were donated from original settlers. Several pieces of furniture including beds, chairs and mattresses were made on-site. One exception is a refrigerator from the 1940s, still running with its top-mounted motor, and a water pump in the kitchen used to provide gravity-fed running water. History buffs will love the fact that Eleanor Roosevelt insisted, against major opposition, that all houses have indoor plumbing before electricity came to the district – one of many interesting facts knowledgeable docents will share during your visit.

A drive through the surrounding area will reveal many of the 218 remaining houses (most privately-owned residences), which distinctively reflect architect William Stanton’s passion for natural materials blended with the earth, including indigenous Crab Orchard stone and fieldstone. Most houses had four to seven rooms, one or two fireplaces, paneled walls, built-in bookcases and batten doors with “Z” braces and hardware. A few houses remain as built, except for electrical rewiring, while others have additions and extensions reflecting a wide range of tastes and budgets.

A natural gem, **Cumberland Mountain State Park** was originally constructed by Civilian Conservation Corps and Works Progress Administration workers, with its mill house built by young workers from American Friends Society. Visitors today will discover two amazing bridges over Byrd Creek: one at Old Mail Road and the other used as the main entrance to the park. That bridge, 28 feet high and 319 feet long, is the largest masonry structure ever built by the CCC. After a day of play, the park offers excellent dining – and a chance to reflect of the area’s past and present.

Interactive Demonstrations at Pioneer Days in May

SGT. ALVIN C. YORK STATE HISTORIC PARK

The park pays tribute to one of the most decorated soldiers of WWI. The park includes a visitor center modeled after York's general store, his two-story house, a gristmill, and a lifesize replica of a WWI trench you can explore. Just outside the park are the Wolf River Methodist Church where he experienced his religious conversion and the Wolf River Cemetery which includes the burial site of Sgt. York and his wife, Miss Gracie.

The park also hosts WWI living history events that include re-enactors, interactive demonstrations, live music, and discussions with experts about Sergeant York and WWI.



CORDELL HULL BIRTHPLACE STATE PARK

Born in a log cabin in Pickett County, Cordell Hull was the longest-serving U.S. Secretary of State, holding the position for 11 years under President Franklin Delano Roosevelt. Hull won the Nobel Peace Prize for his pivotal role in establishing the United Nations.

Tour a representation of Hull's log cabin birthplace and period gardens; the Cordell Hull Museum which displays a variety of photographs and artifacts. You can also take in one of the many events the park hosts throughout the year, or take the pleasant hike to Bunkum Cave where Hull's father had a moonshine still (you'll need a permit to go inside the cave).

GRANVILLE

The entire downtown of Granville is a living museum. At the 1880s T.B. Sutton General Store, you can purchase a town tour ticket which gives you access to the Clemons Car Museum, Southern Shops of Granville, Whistle Stop Saloon, Granville Whiskey Decanter Museum (world's largest collection of limited edition decanters), Mayberry and I love Lucy Museum, Bank Museum, Post Office Museum, Historic Granville Museum, Farm to Table Museum, 1880's Sutton Homestead guided house tour, Pioneer Village with antique car museum, 1800's log cabin, arts and craft building, vintage farm equipment and tools, barn, cottage garden and Tennessee Quilt and Textile Museum. Plus every Saturday night, you can catch the Sutton Old Time Music Hour, featured on Tennessee's Music Pathway.



Rugby's Restored Library

THE VICTORIAN VILLAGE OF RUGBY

On the eastern Plateau in Morgan County is the village of Rugby. Originally founded in 1880 by British author Thomas Hughes, Rugby was built for aristocratic English second sons who planned to create a utopian society in the Americas. The experiment thrived for the first ten years, then struggled and withered. Today Rugby's restored Victorian architecture and picturesque setting make it a popular tourist attraction.

The historic town is a time capsule waiting to be explored. You can step into the restored buildings and have a look around. The library alone is full of first editions of all the greatest literary work from that era, and is one of the oldest public libraries in the United States.

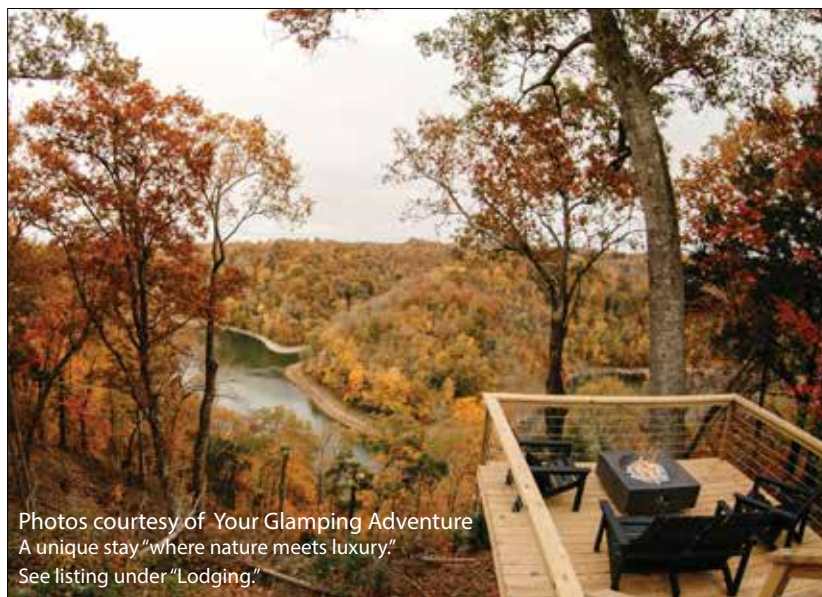
